SANDICAL; Federation meeting

The next Federation meeting will be at 2 p.m., Saturday, Feb. 2, at SANDICAL.

SANDICAL, sponsored by the San Diego County Philatelic Council, will be Feb. 1-3 at the Del Mar Fairgrounds, 2260 Jimmy Durante Blvd., Del Mar.

To reach the Del Mar Fairgrounds from the north, take U.S. 101 south to the I-5 exit toward Santa Ana. Take I-5 to the Via de la Valle exit toward Del Mar. Turn right onto Via de la Valle and go Jimmy Durante Boulevard, where you turn left.

The American Philatelic Society's AmeriStamp Expo 2002 will be held Friday-Sunday,

Feb. 8-10, at the Riverside Convention Center, 3443 Orange St., Riverside. This is the first APS show in Southern California in more than 12 years.

Show hours are 10 a.m.-6 p.m., Friday and Saturday, and 10 a.m.-4 p.m., Sunday.

Admission is free.

Special events include first-day ceremonies at noon Friday for the third U.S. "Happy Birthday" stamp and at 10:30 a.m. Friday for six stamps featuring trains from the Republic of Guinea.

The bourse will feature about 60 dealers from the United States and abroad, and Harmer-Schau will have a three-session auction during the show. Catalogs for the sales will be posted at <www.harmerschau.com>.

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President's message

What's ahead for philately?

I want to thank the Federation for electing me to President.

The SESCAL show appeared to be a success. The attendance was up almost double.

It brings some observations to mind. First, when you look at who is attending the shows, you'll notice the aging of our collecting colleagues. There are more members over 50 than from any other age group. Even the dealers are getting to the age of gray hair. The clubs have a declining membership trend.

The good news is that those who were unable to pay for expensive stamps when they were young now have the disposable income. The stock market has been an ally. When the market went south, the extra funds went into stamps. There are a great deal of collections coming on the market as a result of the

second generation disposing of the collections rather than continuing with them.

The second great boom to collecting is all electronics. E-Bay and Yahoo as well as other "stores" provide a relative "fair market value" of what a stamp is really worth. The classics of Western Europe, once very desirable, now realize 15 percent to 20 percent of Scott. Other countries such as British Africa and the Middle East, as well as Europa, bring a premium to Scott. Worldwide Internet auctions provide a great source of material which be purchased from the comfort of your home.

Let's hope it doesn't impact the future of our shows! Most of us want to see what we're buying.

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Editor wins Distinguished Service Award; prizes for SESCAL exhibitors listed

Federation Reporter editor John Weigle received the Federation's Distinguished Service Award at a surprise presentation at noon on Sunday, the last day of SESCAL.

The award was announced at the SESCAL banquet on Saturday night, but Weigle could not attend because he was working. Ray Clary asked those at the banquet to keep the secret until the presentation ceremony. The show was Oct. 5-7.

The Distinguished Service Award, of course, is not the only presentation made during the awards banquet, which is primarily to present the awards

to the show's exhibitors. This year's grand went to Switzerland: The Sitting Helvetia Perforated Issue 1862-1883, exhibited by Ralph B. Soderberg, M.D., who also received a SESCAL Gold Award, APS Best 19th Century Award, and Felix Ganz Memorial Grand Award

sent with us tonight to please rise. Will each of you please introduce yourself to our group and give the year that you won the award.

"I wish to express not only the appreciation of the Federation to each of you, but also to acknowledge your continuing contributions to both the Federation and to philately in general.

"The plaque is inscribed with the words: 'In Recognition and Appreciation, for Valuable Contributions to the Advancement and Enrichment of Philately.' I know that tonight's recipient is truly the embodiment of these words.

"Tonight's recipient has had a lifelong commitment to stamp collecting and sharing of the hobby with others.

"This person has spent the majority of his life in a county near Los Angeles County. He has served his local stamp club in various capacities, including editing the stamp club newsletter, and has functioned as the General Chairman of his stamp club's annual exhibition. He has served as an officer of the Federation.

"This person is a dedicated collector of Official Seals of the United States Postal Service, and of the postal history of his county.

"Have you guessed who it may be? If you have not, then the next bit of information will give it away.

"This person has authored biweekly columns on philately for his local newspaper for many years.

"He has introduced young people to stamp collecting for almost 20 years by promoting the stamp club at the Anacapa Middle School. He helps sponsor and promote the Anacapa Middle School annual Youth Stamp Fair, which is held two weeks after SESCOAL.

"This person is a member of the American Philatelic Society and the Ventura County Philatelic Society.

"I am sure by now you know who this person is. More specifically he has served in various capacities in the Ventura County Philatelic Society, is a past chairman of VENPEX, a former Vice-President of the Federation, and writes a biweekly

column on philately and stamp collecting for the Ventura Star. He is currently the editor of the Federation Reporter.

"It is my distinct pleasure and privilege to announce our 2001 recipient of the Federation's Distinguished Service Award: JOHN S. WEIGLE.

"John is not with us tonight. Although John has in the past taken vacation from his job at the Ventura Star to attend SESCOAL, the full measure of this man's dedication to our hobby is that he decided this year to use his vacation time to put on the annual Youth Stamp Fair for the Anacapa Middle School.

It was moved and seconded to accept the treasurer's report as presented.

SESCAL Report:

Ray Clary reported that the bourse was down 14 tables, but attendance is up 50 percent over that of last year. Ten tables were cancelled after the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center. The hotel has been very supportive of this unusual situation and has cut costs to SESCAL significantly. We need to give the hotel a very nice hand for the assistance.

Mr. Clary also shared with the group the possibility of a different issue next year: The U. S. Post Office has asked that the October 2002 Mega-Event in New York be scheduled to the first weekend in October so the USPS can have first-day ceremonies to kick off Stamp Collecting Month. Obviously, this is in direct conflict with our normal show dates for SESCAL. Mr. Clary indicated that he would continue to advocate a different date without conflict to SESCAL.

Mr. Clary recognized Wallace Craig for his work for SESCAL during the year and indicated that the bulk of this year's SESCAL efforts had been the result of Wallace's hard work.

Old Business:

Wallace Craig gave a verbal update on the status of the Bob Thompson situation, which appears to be coming to a satisfactory end for SES-

CAL. Bill Estes acknowledged the great work done by Wallace, Jim Bowman and Waultrab Helms, who are researching and presenting SESCAL's case. It is expected that full disclosure of the proceedings will be made when the case is closed.

It was announced that the president of the Hollywood Collector's Club has passed away and that the club has since folded.

There was no other old business.

New Business:

Bill Estes announced that the Federation is seeking nominations for vice president. This is a six-year commitment: two years as vice president, two years as president-elect, and two years as president. Ken Weber was nominated for vice president, seconded, and the nominations were closed when no other nominees were forthcoming. Ken was elected by acclamation.

The election for Federation secretary will be held at the next meeting at SANDICAL. Everyone was encouraged to go back to their clubs to get names of suitable nominees. No one has been nominated at this time. Carolyn Clary has agreed to serve through the next meeting.

Waultrab Helms was prevailed upon to serve again as Federation treasurer. Mrs. Helms was nominated, seconded, and the nominations were closed when no other nominees were presented. Mrs. Helms was nominated, with applause, by acclamation.
